## **Noteworthy Cases & Operational Support**

• Region 1 - Calhoun Field Office – On Wednesday, December 6, 2023, Robert Allen Mowry, a 53-year-old man from Tullahoma, TN was convicted by a Walker County, GA jury for the 1994 murder of James Richard Harris, a 54-year-old man from Chickamauga, GA. GBI agents, the Walker County Sheriff's Office (WCSO), and the Lookout Mountain Judicial Circuit District Attorney's Office worked relentlessly to seek answers and pursue justice. Suspect and witness interviews, persistent investigative acts, DNA testing, and more made this conviction possible after nearly 29 years.

On December 22, 1994, a neighbor found James Harris deceased in his driveway in Chickamauga. Mr. Harris had been struck in the back of the head and strangled to death during an apparent robbery. There were signs of a struggle and a large amount of blood found at the crime scene; however, in 1994, the state crime lab's forensic analysis capabilities on blood-stained items recovered from the scene were limited. Few leads materialized over the years despite diligent investigative efforts by the WCSO and the GBI.

In 2005, the GBI Crime Lab was asked to re-analyze items found at the crime scene. Blood stains on the jeans worn by Mr. Harris, along with stains from a bloody tissue located near the body were submitted for DNA analysis, and were determined to be from a single individual, and not a match to Mr. Harris. Multiple individuals were contacted by the WCSO and the GBI over the years for the purpose of providing a DNA sample to compare against the DNA from the jeans and tissue - no matches were found.

In 2009, a tip received by law enforcement via phone identified the suspect in the murder as a person named "Allen". The WCSO and GBI located an individual who worked with Mr. Harris at Miller Industries in Ooltewah named Robert Allen Mowry who had never previously been contacted in the investigation. Further investigation of Mowry revealed that he had arrived at work late on the date Mr. Harris was murdered, and that he had been seen with a black eye in the days following the murder.

In April 2018, a GBI Agent contacted Mowry by phone and asked to speak to him about Mr. Harris' murder. Mowry replied he had already spoken to law enforcement about the case, which the GBI Agent determined to be untrue. The Agent went to Mowry's home in August 2019 to interview Mowry and received an angry phone call from Mowry in response to the visit. When asked to submit a DNA sample, as others had voluntarily done over the years, Mowry replied that he did not believe in DNA or the results from DNA. Agents with the GBI, the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation, WCSO, and Tullahoma Police Department coordinated surveillance efforts to obtain Mowry's DNA. During their surveillance, officers observed Mowry smoking cigarettes outside his home. Officers conducted a trash pull after Mowry had taken his garbage can to the street and obtained a large number of cigarette butts from the can. The cigarette butts were submitted to the GBI Crime Lab for DNA comparison analysis against the blood from the jeans and tissue at the crime scene, and there was a match to Mowry's DNA. Upon receipt of the match results from the cigarette butts, a search warrant was obtained for Mowry's DNA, and upon comparison, there was a 1 in 3 quadrillion match to the bloody items located at the crime scene.

On December 6, 2023, following a trial lasting seven days, Mowry was convicted of Felony Murder and immediately sentenced by a Superior Court Judge to serve the remainder of his life in the Georgia Department of Corrections. Testimony against Mowry was given by multiple forensic scientists from the GBI Crime Lab, neighbors and coworkers of James Harris, and several local law enforcement officers, as well as officers from the State of Tennessee.

- Appalachian Regional Drug Enforcement Office (ARDEO) On December 27, 2023, the Hall County Sheriff's Office, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives, the Georgia State Patrol, and the ARDEO arrested and charged Fernando Martinez, age 51, of Gainesville GA, with three counts of trafficking methamphetamine and six counts of possession of a firearm during the commission of a felony. The arrest resulted from a search warrant at Pine Circle Drive, Gainesville, GA, on December 21, 2023, for his involvement in trafficking suspected methamphetamine and illegal firearms. This investigation lasted more than one year and led to the seizure of more than two pounds of suspected methamphetamine, seven firearms, and over \$3,000. The street value of the seized methamphetamine is about \$12,000. Martinez was booked into the Hall County Jail. This investigation is ongoing.
- Appalachian Regional Drug Enforcement Office (ARDEO) The White County Sheriff's Office, Habersham County Sheriff's Office, and the ARDEO conducted a multi-day operation in December 2023 that led to the arrest of three people. On December 29, 2023, Cody Lee Fendley, age 38, of Cleveland, GA, was arrested and charged with trafficking methamphetamine and possession of fentanyl with the intent to distribute. Fendley was also wanted from a previous incident for aggravated assault, terroristic threats, and criminal trespass. Ronald Bafile, age 42, of Cleveland, GA, was arrested and charged with trafficking methamphetamine, possession of a firearm during the commission of a felony, possession of marijuana with the intent to distribute, possession of a Schedule IV controlled substance, and fleeing and attempting to elude. Megan Bafile, age 31, of Dahlonega, GA, was arrested and charged with trafficking methamphetamine, possession of a firearm during the commission of a felony, possession of marijuana with the intent to distribute, possession of a Schedule IV controlled substance, and obstruction of law enforcement. During the operation, law enforcement seized more than a pound of suspected methamphetamine, as well as suspected fentanyl and marijuana throughout White and Habersham counties. The Cleveland Police Department also assisted in apprehending one of the suspects. The total street value of the drugs was about \$15,000. This investigation is ongoing.
- Metro Gang Task Force assisted the Atlanta Police Department with Operation Deep Freeze from October through December 2023, targeting criminal street gangs in high crime areas by providing intelligence support, assisting with knock & talks, and serving existing arrest warrants. Murder rates have declined by 19% in Atlanta. Operation stats include: 87 arrests (including 34 gang members), 13 gang charges, and 67 guns recovered.
- Office of Special Investigations (OSI) Cold Case Unit (CCU) The Coleman-Baker Act (CBA) request webform has been on the GBI website Home page since June 30, 2023. Nineteen (19) cold cases are being reviewed at this time. Six (6) were requests from designated family members and thirteen (13) were self-initiated.
- From January 1 to December 31, 2023, the GBI investigated a total of 104 Officer Involved Shootings (OIS). OIS number 104 was on December 29, 2023. GBI's Region 2 Columbus Field Office was requested by the Spalding County Sheriff's Office. On December 29, 2023, at about 11:00 am, the Spalding County Sheriff's Office was dispatched to a welfare check on Deason Road. Upon arrival, the resident, identified as Todd Harper, age 57, fired at the responding deputies, hitting and killing Spalding County Sheriff's Sergeant Marc McIntyre, age 55. A second Deputy received non-life-threatening injuries during the incident. Harper was taken into custody after a standoff with law enforcement. Harper has been arrested and charged with murder. He was booked into the Spalding County Jail. The GBI will conduct an independent investigation. Once complete, the case file will be given to the Griffin Judicial Circuit District Attorney's Office for prosecution.

## **Trainings and Projects**

### **Investigative Division**

- After completing 13 weeks of Basic Agent training, 26 graduates of the 2023 Special Agent School were honored at the Georgia Public Safety Training Center in Forsyth, Georgia, on Thursday, December 21, 2023.
- One hundred forty-six (146) Special Agent applicants passed the Special Agent test and will take part in the applicant assessment scheduled for early February 2024 at the Georgia Public Safety Training Center.

#### **Personnel Matters**

• During the 2023 holiday season, GBI employees filled wish lists of 31 children in foster care for the Clark's Christmas Kids program and 31 vulnerable adults for the Light Up the Holidays for a Vulnerable Georgian program.

#### **Promotion Effective November 2023**

• Kwame Bowens was promoted to the Integrated CJIS Data Center (ICDC) Supervisor in the Georgia Crime Information Center (GCIC), effective November 1, 2023.



## **Investigative Hours Expended - YTD FY2024**





#### GEORGIA APPLICANT PROCESSING SERVICE (GAPS) PROJECT

**Project Description -** The Information Services section of GCIC is seeking to obtain the services of a qualified and experienced vendor to provide an applicant fingerprinting solution that will electronically capture and submit applicant fingerprints to the Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS) and provide Rap Back services. The selected vendor shall also handle receiving fingerprint search results and disseminating results to the requestor.

Monthly Update - The GAPS system is operating, and all change orders are resolved.

#### GEORGIA LAW ENFORCEMENT MESSAGE SWITCH (GLEMS)

**Project Description -** The message switch provides a means of communication between federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies throughout the state of Georgia, the United States, and other countries, and to take advantage of new features and advances in technology. GCIC is working on an upgrade or replacement of this system.

**Monthly Update** - GCIC continues to work with Datamaxx and other SOG Stakeholders to test the production connections and prepare for a 2024 first quarter deployment date.

#### NATIONAL SEX OFFENDER REGISTRY (NSOR) NOTIFICATION PROJECT

**Project Description** - The NSOR project will provide Georgia Department of Early Care and Learning (DECAL) the ability to receive NSOR responses as a part of the criminal history background check, in compliance with Federal, state, and local laws to make complete/accurate fitness determinations.

**Monthly Update** - The NSOR project is moving forward. The MOU was completed and the GTA-DECAL-GBI Statement of Work was signed by the GCIC Director.

#### **RAP BACK PROJECT**

**Project Description** - The Rap Back (RB) project will provide the ability to receive ongoing status notifications of criminal history activity reported on individuals holding positions of trust. Georgia's Rap Back System will include the retention of applicant fingerprints, the implementation of an FBI Rap Back Subscription on such prints, and the creation of a validation process for authorized entities to manage such subscriptions. The Georgia Bureau of Investigation (GBI) is requesting proposals for the Georgia Applicant Processing Service (GAPS) with the Federal Rap Back Subscription Service. The objective of this procurement is to obtain the services of a qualified and experienced vendor to provide real-time, end-to-end, on-line submission of fingerprint images and data, designed to ensure high performance combined with high availability and reliability to the GBI Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS).

**Monthly Update** - GBI staff held an introductory call with the vendor, Idemia. The kickoff meeting is scheduled for December 2023.
